



WE CONTINUED OUR 166 YEAR OLD EFFORTS TOWARDS SOCIAL JUSTICE AND TIKKUN OLAM BY:

- Allocating over \$7,000 to partners citywide from our Social Action Tribute Funds
- Allocating over \$38,000 to eleven partner organizations (the Oregon Food Bank, LiftUP, IRCO, Virginia Garcia Memorial Health Center, NARA, Sunshine Division, NE Emergency Food Program, Stone Soup, Urban Gleaners, and our own Community Holiday Dinner) to combat food insecurity via the Robert Peltz (z"I) High Holidays Funds for Food
- Raising over \$2,500 for Rose Haven at their annual Reigning Roses Walk
- Holding a Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service (even a weeklong ice storm couldn't stop us) and Mitzvah Day, where participants of all ages in sixteen projects for community partners.
- Continuing our work to combat voter suppression with the URJ's RAC (Religious Action Center)
 Every Voice, Every Vote initiative
- Hosting a Community Holiday Dinner with LiftUP, providing over 300 meals, hand knit hats and scarves, and hygiene kits for those in need
- Opening the CBI Campus as warming and cooling shelters for guests of Rose Haven during inclement weather
- And continuing our partnerships with and support of organizations including Lift UP, NW Towers Sunday Food Pantry, Interfaith Alliance on Poverty, JFCS, Rose Haven, Blanchet House, Portland Refugee Support Group

















FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Year End June 30, 2023 resulted in a \$2,095,541 increase of net assets and an operational budget surplus of \$198,887 (driven primarily by employee retention tax credits).
- A \$2,500,000 revolving loan was taken out with The Commerce Bank of Oregon to bridge the cash flow/funding gap between The Jennie donations and construction as well as operational startup losses. We have drawn down \$565,000. The amount borrowed will convert to a loan in March 2025.
- On the statement of activities, revenue and expenses for The Jennie are included in our March 31 numbers. The program was not included in our operational budget in FY24 and therefore is not in the budget column.
- To date, we have raised approximately \$2.4 million for The Jennie. Final construction/project estimates are \$3.3 million.
- We are projecting FY24 membership to exceed budget by approximately \$15,000, 1% growth over last year.
- Our Back to School Night fundraiser raised a record \$364,388 from 64 sponsors and 80 donors participating in our Mitzvah Moment! The fundraiser netted approximately \$295,000.
- Thanks to several donors, our funds have provided close to \$49,000 in Religious School scholarships to 104 students and helped fund \$48,000 in camps and trips for 58 kids.








OUR IDEA (INCLUSION, DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND ACCESS) COMMITTEE WORKED TO MAKE OUR COMMUNITY MORE WELCOMING AND ACCESSIBLE BY:

- Creating an event planning guide to ensure CBI events are as inclusive and accessible as possible
- Hosting JDAIM (Jewish Disability Awareness, Acceptance, and Inclusion) Shabbat
- Introducing Accommodation Stations, enabling full participation and comfort at our worship services.
 - These stations are stocked with resources and supplies such as large print prayer books and noise isolating headphones
- Facilitating learning opportunities and trainings for CBI leadership and the broader community
- Making improvements for accessibility across our historic campus including high visibility tape, improving doorway thresholds, and ensuring bathroom access.
- Establishing all gender bathrooms
- Making pronoun stickers available at all CBI events
- Working toward a more accessible website



Congregation Beth Israel's Inclusion, Diversity, Equity & Access (IDEA) Committee Update to the Community | May 2024

In May 2023, the CBI membership amended its bylaws to form the **Inclusion**, **Diversity**, **Equity & Access (IDEA) Committee**, whose mission is to create a culture of belonging by ensuring that all aspects of congregational life are attuned to the experiences and abilities of all who engage with the Beth Israel community. The Committee's focus is to enhance CBI's accessibility in our spaces and in our electronic resources, facilitate community building, and fortify CBI's commitment to anti-bias education and practices.

Our work is informed by resources developed by the Religious Action Center of the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ-RAC), the Jews of Color Initiative, and the Jewish Federation of Greater Portland's 2023 study by Brandeis University Cohen Center. The committee and our goals grew out of an intensive assessment process that several congregants, clergy and staff participated in during the spring of 2022.

Approximately 20 CBI members serve on the committee, and we collaborate closely with clergy and staff who have provided invaluable support and guidance to our work.

Progress Report

The IDEA Committee is proud of CBI's commitment to fostering a culture of belonging and to the inspiring leadership of our clergy and leaders. In the year since the committee's official launch, we have made significant progress, including:

- Creating an Event planning guide and checklist. Volunteers Andrea Mia and Rachel Pollin have developed a resource that will be shared with staff, committees, clergy and congregants who host events at CBI to ensure that events are inclusive and accessible.
- Engaging website developer NetRaising to create a new CBI website. We are
 collaborating with NetRaising to design a site that incorporates accessibility best
 practices and reflects the diversity and values of our community. Volunteers Janie
 Goldenberg and Aina Pinto are heading the project in coordination with CBI staff
 member Tracy Alifanz. Janie and Aina have spent hours auditing the current website and
 consulting a variety of vendors in preparation for this project.
- Holding a "Beyond Welcoming" training session for Board, staff and clergy led by Rachel Hall of URJ-RAC. The program emphasized that good intentions without corresponding action is not enough to have a positive experience on community members' experiences.
- Conducting an audit of the CBI campus to identify accessibility barriers. In light of
 the insights gained through the audit, staff have implemented several upgrades that
 create greater ease in accessing our facilities such as installing high visibility tape,

improving doorway thresholds, ensuring bathroom access and updating signage. We continue to explore and implement additional solutions for improving access to CBI facilities.

- Raising awareness about the need to consider accessibility when planning events and programs. While the preference is to locate events where no accessibility limitations exist, this cannot always be accomplished. When there are known barriers, CBI now shares this information in event promotion so that people can plan and make informed choices.
- Celebrating Jewish Disability Awareness, Acceptance & Inclusion Month (JDAIM).
 CBI held a joyful special shabbat service to commemorate JDAIM in February 2024.
- Launching our Accommodation Stations. Staff have assembled carts offering a variety
 of resources, including large-print prayerbooks and noise-isolating headphones, to help
 ensure greater comfort and participation at CBI.
- Facilitating opportunities to discuss anti-bias themes. We offered several
 opportunities for CBI members to explore and discuss anti-bias themes including the
 clergy-led Racial Equity Challenge and the IDEA Conversation Hour facilitated by
 volunteers Marsha Goldwasser and Shoshana Zeisman-Pereyo.
- Offering pronoun stickers. CBI now makes available pronoun stickers for name badges at all CBI events.

URJ-RAC staff have invited committee co-chairs Phyllis Oster and Sue Aronowitz to share CBI's progress and successes in their Racial Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (REDI) trainings for other congregations.

- Allocated over \$30,000 to support projects ranging from CBI Artist –in-Residence Kim Schneiderman's Shabbat album, Every Season Every Moment, a Passover Seder for JFCS clientele, CBI's annual Women's Seder, large print prayer books for the CBI community, and CBI's forthcoming website accessibility redesign.
- Continued their social action on behalf of refugees and our neighbors at Rose Haven
- Built community and connection through by leading monthly Shabbat services at Cedar Sinai park, organizing CBI's annual Sisterhood Shabbat service, co-sponsoring Havdalah at Rose Schnitzer Manor, led by Cantor Green (over 60 participants), coordinating CBI's Rosh Hashanah Sweets table, and connecting via book talks, membership schmoozes, Jewish yoga, a "naked lady" clothing swap, a mahjong fundraiser, and much more




SOME OF OUR BIGGEST NEWS IMPACTED OUR LITTLEST COMMUNITY MEMBERS:

Enrolled 291 students in preschool through grade twelve


 20 of whom made their voices heard in our Oneg! Choir and 5of whom rocked out in our Oneg! Band

- Weekly online Torah Study with international scholars




We supported all this learning with **Back to School Night**, our recordbreaking fundraiser, which, under the leadership of **Michelle Gradow**,

Our Board of Trustees unanimously voted to move forward with Rabbi Rachel Joseph and Cantor Rayna Green as our new clergy leaders
